A little about Singapore

HISTORY

An ancient Malay legend says Singapore was founded when a Sumatran prince saw a lion - considered a good omen - on the island of Temasek. It was named Singapura, or 'Lion City'. Singapura became a minor trading post for the Sumatran Srivijaya empire and subsequently a state of the Javanese Majapahit empire in the mid-13th century. In 1819, Sir Stamford Raffles established a trading station here and it became a flourishing British colony with a military and naval base. Singapore's People's Action Party was elected in 1959, with Lee Kuan Yew as Prime Minister. He remained in this position for over 30 years and is widely acknowledged as the founding father of modern Singapore. In 1963, Singapore formed a union with Malaya (now Malaysia) but gained independence by 1965. Since then, Singapore has experienced rapid development and become the economic success story of the region.



WEATHER

Singapore has a tropical climate with no distinct seasons. It is characterised by uniform temperatures, high humidity and high rainfall. The average temperature is between 25°C / 77°F and 31°C / 88°F , and humidity averages around 70-90%.

DISCOVERING SINGAPORE'S UNDERGROUND

Singapore has a vast network of underground walkways linking malls and train stations. It's a great way to avoid the heat and rain. Most underground walkways start and end at Mass Rapid Transit (MRT) stations, and the routes are well sign-posted (see page 13).

Local cuisine & dietary restrictions

Singapore's food scene is diverse and multi-cultural. All diets are well catered for. For those with dietary restrictions, many restaurants offer halal, gluten-free or nut-free options.

People with nut allergies should be aware nuts and peanut oil are widely used in many Asian cuisines. Allergies are generally well understood here, but should be clearly communicated.

Drinking water: Tap water is safe to drink in Singapore.

TAX REFUND SCHEME

Visitors to Singapore can claim a refund on the 8% Goods and Services Tax (GST) paid on your purchases, if you spend more than \$100 at any participating shops.

Look for a "Tax free shopping" logo or sign in store, or ask the retail staff.



Tipping: Cash tips are generally not part of the local culture.

Most restaurants automatically include a service charge of 10%.

Cash & Cards: Credit cards are widely accepted in Singapore. You can pay by credit card for most items and services. Exceptions are red-coloured taxis (Transcab), and some hawker centres.

If you need to change currency, there are money exchange centres at Changi Airport, Raffles Place and many other locations.



Use of English

Although there are four official languages (English, Malay, Mandarin & Tamil), English is the working language and is spoken everywhere.

'Singlish' - some local terms

Singapore has its own pidgin language known as Singlish. This derives from various languages used here, primarily Malay, Hokkien, Cantonese, Mandarin, Tamil and English. Here are some terms you might hear, and their meanings:

Aiyo: an expression to describe shock.

Atas: Malay for "up", used to describe something or someone high-class or luxury.

Can: Means the same as in English but used in an abbreviated way. Also interchangeable with 'yes'. (For example, if you ask someone 'Lunch at 12.30?' they might reply simply "Can").

Chope: meaning to reserve a place.


Kiasu: afraid of missing out, trying to push ahead of others.

Lah or Lar: used to punctuate the sentence or the previous word. The word itself has no meaning.

Makan: Food or eating. For example, "makan already?" means "have you eaten already?"

Shiok: referring to food as delicious, or something as very good.

Ya: "yes" in English

MARINA BAY SANDS CONVENTION CENTRE

The Convention Centre is conveniently located within the Marina Bay Sands (MBS) complex which also contains a hotel, many restaurants and bars, and a highend shopping centre with a pharmacy and supermarket. It is a short taxi ride to the Singapore CBD. The Bayfront Mass Rapid Transit (MRT) station (circle/downtown line) is located in the basement of the MBS complex.

Transport

TAXIS

Singapore taxis are reliable, safe and cheap. The main companies are ComfortDelgro and SMRT Taxi. Both have user-friendly booking apps, or they can be hailed on the street. Red taxis (Transcab) only accept cash. www.comfortdelgro.com www.smrt.com.sg

TRAIN (MRT)

Singapore has one of the world's most efficient Mass Rapid Transit networks. It is modern, clean, safe and cheap. Tips: One-time tickets can be bought at the ticket machines at any MRT station, or approach the Customer Service counter to buy a reusable smartcard.

Singapore offers several bike-share services. The bikes can be found in many locations around the city. An electric scooter is also a fun way to get around.

WHAT IS A MERLION?

The Merlion is a mythical creature with the head of a lion and the body of a fish. It was first designed in 1964 for the Singapore **Tourist Promotion** Board, as an emblem of Singapore. The fish tail symbolises Singapore's past as a fishing village. and the lion head symbolises the city's first name 'Singapura' ('lion city' in Sanskrit).



Activities & Places

CBD/CENTRAL/MARINA BAY

Gardens by the Bay

A spectacular garden with a huge variety of plants and attractions. Don't miss the sub-tropical Cloud Forest conservatory with its indoor waterfall, and the man-made Supertrees, which have a sound and light show at 7:45pm and 8:45pm. www.gardensbythebay.com.sg

Marina Bay Sands

The three towers have become a symbol of Singapore, housing a hotel, convention centre, restaurants, bars, high-end shops and a casino. For the best views of Singapore, buy tickets to the SkyPark observation deck, or have a meal or drink at the rooftop CeLaVie or Spago. The nightly Marina Bay sound and light show is best viewed from the promenade in front of the Marina Bay Sands Shoppes. 8pm and 9pm Sun – Thurs, 8pm, 9pm and 10pm Fri and Sat. www.marinabaysands.com

Marina Bay walking trail

Marina Bay is just over 3km in circumference, and a walk around the Bay is a great way to see some key sights, including the famous Merlion water fountain, the mouth of the Singapore River, the durian-shaped Esplanade Theatre, Marina Bay Sands and the architecturally significant Helix Bridge. https://www.ostrichtrails.com/asia/singapore/marina-bay-walking-trail/

Asian Civilisations Museum

National Gallery

The former Supreme Court and City Hall of Singapore were extensively renovated to create this stunning Gallery. The upper levels have several excellent restaurants and bars. www.nationalgallery.sg

National Museum

The ground floor of this 1887 building houses an excellent exhibition on the history and development of Singapore. www.nationalmuseum.sg

RIVER VALLEY/CLARKE QUAY/ ORCHARD

Fort Canning Park

This lush park boasts many historical attractions, including the former residence of Sir Stamford Raffles and other Governors of Singapore; and a WWII bunker where the British decided to surrender to the Japanese in 1942. It's also a favourite place of current Singapore Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong, so you may spot him strolling around the gardens here.

Clarke Quay and Boat Quay

Two of the city's liveliest nightlife spots. It's a short stroll between the two Quays and along the way there are many bars and restaurants housed in historic old shophouse buildings, and the old Hill Street Police Station (now a government office), with its instagrammable colourful shutters.

Singapore Botanic Gardens

On the fringe of the Orchard Rd shopping precinct, this 150-year-old garden was made a UNESCO Heritage site in 2015. Don't miss the world-famous orchid garden. It also has several excellent restaurants, such as Halia (see 'Dining'). www.nparks.gov.sg/SBG

Chijmes

One of the buildings on this site, Caldwell House, dates back to the 1840s. The former convent and girls school is now a function venue. The surrounding complex hosts numerous restaurants and bars. www.chijmes.com.sq

Orchard Road Walk

Whether you're after some window shopping and people-watching, or if you'd like to do serious damage to your credit card, Orchard Road is the place for you. Mall after mall offers everything from budget shops to high-end luxury. If you only have time for one mall, ION Orchard, above Orchard MRT station, is one of the biggest and has some excellent restaurants. If you're in Singapore for Christmas or Chinese New Year, the street decorations along Orchard Rd are worth a visit. www.orchardroad.org

Lumina Light show, Singapore Zoo: Open your eyes to a different perspective of Singapore Zoo that you will not see during the day.

BUGIS/KAMPONG GLAM

Arab St walking tour

This is one of the most culturally rich parts of Singapore. Malay royalty historically resided here, and it was a busy trading area. Now it houses many restaurants and shops selling everything from carpets to fabric to homewares. The Malay Heritage Centre has a suggested walking trail.

Masjid Sultan Mosque

One of Singapore's most prominent and beautiful mosques, it was built in 1824. www.sultanmosque.sg

Haji Lane

A very hip and trendy little laneway with some great shopping and nightlife. The street art is worth a look too.

CHINATOWN/TELOK AYER

Chinatown walk

The Chinatown Heritage Centre is a good first stop to learn more about this historic area. They also offer walking tours.

Buddha Tooth Relic Temple

The temple is so named as it contains a tooth of Buddha, which was recovered from his funeral pyre in Kushinagar, India. It also has several other sacred artefacts, artworks and Buddha statues. www.btrts.org.sg

Sri Mariamman Temple

The oldest Hindu temple in Singapore dates from 1827. It's dedicated to the Goddess Mariamman, known for her power to cure illnesses and diseases. www.smt.org.sg

Telok Ayer Green

Telok Ayer Street is one of the oldest streets in Singapore. Formerly on the waterfront (prior to land reclamation), it was the main landing point for Chinese immigrants and became the centre of Chinese settlement. Now, it's a peaceful spot with several sculptures and plaques depicting Singapore's history. Especially interesting is the mural on the Amoy Street wall of the Thian Hock Keng temple.

Thian Hock Keng Temple

Thian Hock Keng, built in 1839, is one of the oldest and most significant Hokkien temples in Singapore. It's dedicated to Mazu, Goddess of the Sea, and Chinese immigrants came here to give thanks for their safe passage from China. www.thianhockkeng.com.sg

Gardens by the Bay: A fantastic open public garden with water parks, nightly light displays at the Supertree Grove, Satay By The Bay and a heap of attractions. Worth spending many a day there!

LITTLE INDIA

Sri Veeramakaliamman Temple

Built by early Indian immigrants, this Hindu temple became a focus of Indian social and cultural activities. It's dedicated to the goddess and destroyer of evil, Sri Veeramakaliamman or Kali. www.srivkt.org

House of Tan Teng Niah

This Chinese villa in the heart of Little India is famous for its colorful exterior, and is one of the most photographed buildings in Singapore. https://www.roots.gov.sg/places/places-landing/Places/landmarks/little-india-heritage-trail-serangoon-in-the-1900s/former-house-of-tan-teng-niah

Mustafa Centre

This vast building is open 24 hours, but to avoid the crowds it's best to visit on a weekday morning. For Singaporeans, if you don't know where to buy something the answer is always 'you'll find it at Mustafa'. www.mustafa.com.sg

Tekka Centre

Hawker food centre and market. One of Singapore's largest wet markets (so called because perishables are kept on beds of ice, meaning the floor of these markets is always wet). Amazing spices, and if you're looking for fresh fruit and vegetables, try Chia's Vegetables (stall #01-08).

Indian Heritage Centre

Housed in a new, architecturally significant building, the Indian Heritage Centre is a great source of information about Indian culture in Singapore, and the development of Little India. www.indianheritage.org.sg

EAST COAST

East Coast Park

This beachfront park is a peaceful, scenic spot for a walk or run, cycling or picnic. There are a number of good restaurants (and a hawker centre, East Coast Lagoon Food Village) within the park, see 'Dining'. https://www.nparks.gov.sg/gardens-parks-and-nature/parks-and-nature-reserves/east-coast-park

Hainanese Chicken Rice

Main ingredients: chicken, chicken bone stock, rice.

Where to try: most Hawker markets have a chicken rice stall, try Tian Tian at Maxwell Food Centre.

Chilli Crab

Main ingredients: whole crab (often Mud Crabs), in a tomato and chilli sauce.

Where to try: the Jumbo Seafood chain, Satay by the Bay or Palm Beach.

Bak Kut Teh

Main ingredients: pork ribs in a broth of herbs and spices including garlic, cinnamon, star anise and fennel seeds.

Where to try: The Song Fa restaurant chain.

Ice Kachang

Main ingredients: syrup flavoured shaved ice dessert that contains various toppings like red beans, jelly and sweet corn

Where to try: Any hawker market dessert stall.

Durian

This spiky oval-shaped fruit is banned on public transport and in many hotels because of its overwhelming odour. Despite this, the fruit is highly prized for its creamy flesh. If you're willing to try this pungent fruit, there are sellers in Chinatown and most food markets. Some will even let you taste before you buy.

Peranakan Culture

About the Peranakan

Loosely translated as "local born" Peranakan is a hybrid culture that developed when foreign merchants married local women. Throughout the Malay archipelago including Singapore, Chinese and Indian men married into local Malay or Indonesian families resulting in a unique fusion including Dutch and Portuguese elements. Most prominent within the Singapore blended Peranakan heritages, and reflected in the emergent Nonya cuisine, was the blend of Chinese and Malay traditions with local indigenous ingredients, herbs and spices.

Peranakan culture

The Peranakan Museum at 39 Armenian Street houses the most comprehensive ancestral account of Peranakan cultural development with both an extensive permanent collection and frequent visiting exhibits.

Next to the museum, visitors can taste the elements of Nonya cuisine at True Blue Cuisine, www.truebluecuisine.com. Think a delicate fusion of the gentle heat from red chillis, an earthy spiciness of galangal, the delicate tang of lemongrass, the iniquitousness of coconut milk, a salty undertone of belachan (dry shrimp paste) and the vibrancy of fresh lime.






